E-scooters Run Out Of Time

The scourge of being run off the pavement by battery powered bicycles and scooters could soon be at an end as the City Mayor asks the public for ideas on ways to shape a new approach to keeping the city's public spaces free from anti-social behaviour.

Sir Peter Soulsby is worried about the nuisance associated with street drinking, begging, the unauthorised use of PA equipment, and the dangerous use of bikes, e-bikes and scooters.

E-bikes and electric scooters are a particular menace in West Leicester where a lot of them treat the pavement like a roadway and a red traffic light is just a suggestion.

Leicester's police has joined

other forces across the UK and announced that they will now seize illegally souped-up e-bikes and e-scooters on public highways without any initial warning. Since June 2023, they have issued 152 warnings and seized eight e-scooters and five e-mopeds.

new online consultation to establish if there's support for the introduction of a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO), which would let the police and authorised council officers take swift enforcement action against those causing a nuisance in the protected zone.

Sir Peter said: "We know that other cities are experiencing similar problems, but it's unacceptable that the behaviour of a few individuals should spoil the city centre for the rest of us."

The currently proposed PSPO would only cover the area just beyond Leicester's inner ring road, and does not apply to West Leicester, but other protection orders could very well be in the offing.

If adopted, the PSPO is valid for three years and would take effect from 1 April 2025.

BRAUNSTONE GATE ROADWORKS

A £600 000 scheme is under way to improve a busy Plans to improve the River Soar in West Leicester road in Leicester's Braunstone Gate area for pedestrians and cyclists.

The city council is carrying out 3 months of roadworks A new partnership called "Restoring the Soar" has on Duns Lane, to create new cycle tracks and improve footpaths along the full length of the road, between Braunstone Gate and St Augustine Road.

Duns Lane is restricted to one-way traffic, from Braun- Canal & River Trust and stone Gate to St Augustine Road and a diversion is in Leicestershire & Rutland Wildplace but businesses are open as normal.

Cllr Geoff Whittle, assistant city mayor for environment and transport, said: "This will help provide a muchimproved link to existing infrastructure for people on foot, on bikes, using wheelchairs or other mobility aids, extending the network of people-friendly routes in and around Braunstone Gate and De Montfort University."

CAREY'S COMPOST

Happy New Year! I know that after all our festivities January and early February may seem like a quiet time for gardening, but there's plenty to do to prepare your green space for the year ahead. From pruning to planting, the colder winter days provide opportunities to tend your garden and get it

ready for spring. It's the ideal time for tidying and organising. I generally start by clearing away debris such as fallen leaves and dead plants. This helps prevent pests and diseases from overwintering in my garden. Then, my least favourite chores: I clean and sharp-



en the tools and organise the shed and greenhouse for easy access to equipment when spring arrives.

Once the housekeeping is done, It's not a bad idea sweet peas in pots. Ke to prune dormant trees, shrubs, and hedges, using watered. your newly sharpened tools! Focus on fruit trees like By tackling these task apple and pear, as well as wisteria and roses, to stage for a vibrant, he encourage healthy growth and flowering. Avoid prun-year. Happy gardening!

ing stone fruits such as cherries and plums until summer to prevent the spread of silver leaf disease.

Use any downtime to plan your garden for the year ahead, but that can really depend on your level of enthusiasm! Some ideas include ordering seeds, bulbs, and plants from catalogues or online. You could easily draw up a planting schedule to ensure a continuous supply of flowers and veggies throughout the year. There are online guides which can help.

Protect tender plants from frost by covering them with horticultural fleece or cloches. Move potted plants to sheltered areas or indoors if temperatures are forecast to drop significantly. If the ground isn't frozen, spread well-rotted manure or compost over your beds. This enriches the soil and prepares it for spring planting. Avoid digging when the soil is waterlogged though, as it can damage its structure.

I think it's important to help garden wildlife by leaving out food and fresh water for birds. Clean bird feeders regularly to prevent the spread of diseases. Consider building bug hotels or leaving log piles for insects and small mammals.

If you have a greenhouse or cold frame, now's the time to sow early seeds like broad beans, peas, and sweet peas in pots. Keep them protected and well-watered.

By tackling these tasks in January, you'll set the stage for a vibrant, healthy garden throughout the year. Happy gardening! *Carey Tunstall*

<u>Jan Police Update</u>

An investigation is underway after a police car collided with three pedestrians close to the junction of Narborough Road and Upperton Road.

Shortly after 4.40pm on Monday 13 January a pursuit was authorised in relation to a blue BMW that failed to stop for police. As the officer driving the police vehicle attempted to pursue the car it collided with three pedestrians.

A woman in her 30s and two 10-year-old children were assessed at the scene. The woman suffered a minor injury. The children were not injured.

Investigating officers are asking anyone who witnessed the collision to come forward if they have not already spoken to police.

The blue BMW, that failed to stop, made off from the area. Enquiries are ongoing in relation to this.

The incident has been reviewed and does not require a referral to be made to the Independent Office for Police Conduct (IOPC).

While the start of the New Year was bitterly cold and very wet, it still turned out to be surprisingly productive on 9th and 10th of January.

On the 9th, a report of an attempted house break-in on Muriel Road, off Glenfield Road, turned out to uncover a cannabis farm! One rather large and hard door knock later, the house was secured and a substantial amount of plants seized. Officers went back there the next day when the electricity had been made safe and the cannabis grow dismantled. Investigation is still ongoing regarding this grow and the incident leading up to its discovery.

The Fosse Beat Team Fosse have been on patrol to deter people from causing harm within the community. Officers have been busy investigating recent thefts from motor vehicles on Franche Road & Tyrrell Street. Sadly, there's been an increase in vehicles being targeted across West Leicester. Please be mindful when leaving your vehicle, ensuring they are locked and secure, and do not leave anything inside. Thieves are looking into vehicles and checking door handles to see if they are open or are using an object to smash the window. Also think about your insurance!

The Braunstone & Rowley Fields beat team helped colleagues at a concern for welfare call at an address in Westcotes, whilst on patrol a stolen van was located, recovered and sent for forensic examination and officers have been conducting arrest attempts, collaring a number of people wanted for drug and weapon offences in the process.

All the Beat Teams are committed to preventing the supply of drugs in our communities, and to reducing the demand for these substances by encouraging users to seek support from local services.


