

The Wedding of William and Kate sparked Roger Blackmore to examine Leicester's sometimes bloody royal history.

LEICESTER'S ROYAL HISTORY

Following the Norman Conquest of 1066, Hugh de Grantesmil was appointed Governor of Leicester. It was he who built the first Castle in the town, but later fell out with King Henry the First who drove the Governor out of the town and destroyed the castle.

History nearly repeated itself some years later when a new Governor foolishly championed the cause of Queen Eleanor against her husband, Henry 2nd, who in 1173, laid siege to Leicester the town which he then sacked and burned, slaughtering a large number of its inhabitants. This particular King Henry did not do things by halves.

After a period in the doldrums Leicester rose to prominence once again, firstly in the time of Simon De Montfort in the 11th Century, and later in the days of John of Gaunt during the late 1300's. Indeed it was Gaunt's grandson, eventually Henry 6th, who on one of his many visits to Leicester, received his knighthood in a ceremony at St Mary de Castro.

In the 15th Century, Leicester took the Yorkist side during the Wars of the Roses. The last Yorkist monarch, Richard 3rd, visited the town twice; the second occasion being on the eve of the Battle of Bosworth in 1485. It was this historic event, of course, that ushered in the age of the Tudors.

One must assume that Leicester followed the short rise and rapid fall of Lady Jane Grey of Bradgate with some interest. Highly educated, she was never theless, the victim of political scheming, leading her to occupy the throne for 9 days before being beheaded for high treason. She was later regarded a political victim and martyr, but the rest of the Tudor period brought relative calm to Leicester.

King James 1st came with his wife and family on a four day visit shortly after his coronation in 1567 and made several more visits to Leicester thereafter. However the city fathers found these visits rather too costly and it was not long before further royal visits were not exactly encouraged.

In the Civil War (1642-1651) Leicester declared for Parliament, (The Roundheads) but during the hostilities, both King Charles, who once lodged at Aylestone, and Prince Rupert found themselves in the town.

There have, of course, been numerous royal visits to the City since those days. I well recall the present Queen riding in a motorcade along Wyngate

Drive sometime in the early seventies and also welcoming her to the National Space Centre a few years ago when I was Leader of the Council No doubt it will not be too long before the newest royal newly weds make an official visit to our City.

Eye Protection from the Summer Sun

Damaging ultra violet rays radiate directly from the sun, but they are also reflected from the ground, from water, snow, sand and other bright surfaces.

Long-term exposure to UV rays can lead to cataracts, macular degeneration or skin cancer around the evelids

A wide brimmed hat or cap will block about half of UV rays but eyewear that absorbs UV rays gives the most protection.

All types of eyewear, including prescription and non-prescription glasses, contact lenses and lens implants, should absorb UV-A and UV-B rays. For UV protection in everyday eyewear, there are several options like UV-blocking lens materials, coatings and photochromic lenses.

In bright weather, sunglasses should be worn when you are outdoors; but choose carefully. Opt for glasses that reduce glare, filter out 99-100% of UV rays, are comfortable and do not distort colours.

Children are at special risk, so ensure the sunglasses are undamaged and fit. The lenses should be large enough to shield the eyes from most angles, be tough and impact resistant.

Election Day May 5th

This is one of the most important elections in **100 years.** Not only can we take our pick of 45 local candidates across our West Leicester wards, but we elect the city's first Mayor from a list of 11 contenders. Importantly, we could change the national political landscape for ever by voting in the referendum for A.V or the alterna-

tive voting system, which would replace the current 'first past the post' system of electing the House of Commons.

This is only the second time a referendum has been held in Britain in our entire history. It is also the first time there is the chance to vote for an elected Mayor of Leicester.



There are currently 12 elected Mayors in England, but referendums are being held in four cities to abolish the post.

A communications revolution has almost, but not quite, slipped under most people's radar. Richard Perry gets to grips with Skype...

Nice Box - What's in it? **Richard Perry**

It already has over 660 million registered users and is a bit like the traditional Windows Messenger Service on steroids – welcome to the world of Skype!

This is a software application which lets you make voice calls and video chat with your contacts also on the Skype system.

Skype to Skype is free to use, unless you're buying into the high use multi function business applications. It became popular for the additional features including instant messaging, file transfer, and video conferencing, but calls to mobiles or landlines are charged by direct debit.

Skype-to-Skype calls accounted for 13% of all international call minutes in 2009 that's a total of 54 billion Skype calls; clearly making a hole in traditional telecom businesses.

It's a very flexible "Peer to Peer" system which makes use of background processing on home computers, running Skype software, instead of the traditional client-server system.

Registered users are identified by a unique name, and can be listed in the Skype directory. Skype allows these users to communicate through both instant messaging and voice chat between pairs of users and conference calling. Skype's text chat allows group chats, emoticons, storing chat history, offline messaging and editing of previous messages. All the usual features familiar to instant messaging users, like user profiles, online status indicators, and so on, are also included.

Last year, they released an application allowing Facebook users to text, chat or call to their friends as well as the facility to allow Skype calls to be made on an iPhone over the 3G network. It might sound a little complicated, but it's easier than it sounds. To use it, make sure you have a web cam and voice capability, install the software and off you go, but remember you can only connect with people also on the Skype network, anything else will cost, so read the instructions!



Tony Huxley's Garden Tidings

For just about every noteworthy event and person there is a plant, and Royal events are no exception.

This year you can show your patriotism for longer than a Chinese made plastic Union Jack takes to fade, by cultivating a plant with Royal pedigree to remind you of the special occasion for years to come.

Papaver orientale or

"Royal Wedding" says it all. This large perennial poppy has snowy white petals that sometimes have the faintest hint of pink which contrast with the black markings at the centre. It may struggle



to flower by April 29th but it should be in bloom soon after.

What could be more regal than a rose? So it's no surprise that one is being released for the happy event, "Catherine" is a floribunda rose with a bushy habit that has been bred to commemorate the wedding. Not only does it acknowledge the soon-to-be Roval bride but also the day of the event, St. Catherine's day. It has soft pink blooms, and will continue to flower until the first winter frosts, which may also mark the end of the honey-

moon period. It's being sold exclusively by that famous purveyor of regal artefacts. Focus DIY.

If you want a male counterpart, why not pair it with a variety of Amelanchier cana-



densis (also laughing- Amelanchier canadensis ly know as a Chuckleberry) called "Prince William". 


